United in Mission

Almost every parish in our diocese enjoys a long tradition of parish organizations which help carry out the mission of the parish. Countless men and women dedicate countless hours to promoting the unique activities of each organization which in its own way help build up Christ's kingdom in the local

parish. As the chief shepherd of the diocese, I praise and support the pastoral work of these parish organizations which are a vital part of parish life. In order to help foster this co-operative work, I wish to highlight some practical aspects in the relationship between the parish organization and the parish.

Parish organizations take on many forms including the Altar and Rosary Society, Ladies' Guild, Men's Club, Parents' Club, Athletic Association, Youth Group and more. These organizations are not separately incorporated as are certain national organizations such as the Knights of Columbus. Parish organizations are a part of the parish's civil incorporation. Although a parish organization may include by-laws, parish organizations are a function of the parish. They are not autonomous and distinct from the greater operation of the parish. They assist the parish in fulfilling its mission.

As a function of the parish's mission, parish organizations stand under the governance of the parish which must follow diocesan statutes, universal Church law and civil law. As shepherd of the parish, the pastor is charged with overseeing and coordinating all activities within the parish – including parish organizations. Although each organization advances its unique activities, these activities are directed ultimately by the pastor. This direction ensures fulfilling the parish's mission.

Furthermore, revenues generated and donations received by the parish organization are assets of the parish. Regardless of where these assets are deposited, they are owned by the parish – not the parish organization. As parish property, they are governed by diocesan statute, universal Church law and civil law. Pastors exercise vigilance and oversight over these funds primarily using them in keeping with the organization's purpose but also as needed for the greater good of the parish. This governance ensures that both the funds and the organization's leaders are protected. Furthermore, these directives provide a unified pastoral mission within the parish.

In conclusion, I offer my praise and gratitude for the countless people who serve their parish's mission through volunteering in a parish organization. These organizations are the source of many acts of

charity, social activity, formation of our youth and so much more. All of these good works advance the parish mission and help build up the Kingdom. Please know of my prayers for all of the efforts of these organizations which I know will be better served through the insights which I have highlighted.

NURSE'S CORNER

What is High Blood Pressure? (Information from the American Heart Association). Blood pressure is the force of blood against artery walls. Your doctor measures two numbers when checking your blood pressure. The first (systolic pressure) measures the pressure in your arteries while your heart is The second (diastolic pressure) measures the contracting. pressure while your heart rests between beats. Normal blood pressure is less that 120/80mm Hg (millimeters of mercury) if you're an adult. You have pre-hypertension if your top number (systolic) is 120-139 or your bottom number (diastolic) is 80-89. High blood pressure (hypertension) means your top number is 140 or higher or your bottom number is 90 or higher. If you have hypertension your blood pressure should be lowered to under 140/90. To find out if your blood pressure is high, get it checked. A blood pressure check is quick and painless. High blood pressure can lead to strokes and other medical problems. If it is determined you are at risk for blood pressure problems, see a doctor for a checkup and evaluation as soon as possible.

Blood pressure checks are done monthly at each of the Weekend Masses by the Parish Nurses. Stop by this weekend.
